LITTLE SHEEP

2024 was a wonderful year of ministry under the Lord. We saw the continued growth of our Little Sheep ministry. It has astonished me to see how many less familiar with church, are willing to engage not only in our community but also with stories about Jesus on a weekly basis.

PASTORAL CARE

We've been growing our pastoral capacities as a church in many ways. We have been seeking to love our neighbour as ourselves by growing in our understanding of the mental health challenges of young people and how to be welcoming place for those with dementia. Many at SHAP have taken up a role of praying, listening, visiting and encouraging each other in the Lord.



COMMUNITY LUNCH

Our community lunches continue to provide much needed connection, care and joy to SHAP and the wider community. Doreen Laforest and Genevieve Scarf have led a wonderful team of volunteers to make this space a blessing to anyone who enters. It has been a joy to have Woollahra Council acknowledge this work and to enable us with a grant to continue to serve at a high level.

SOCIAL OUTREACH

We continue to look well beyond our immediate community into the lives of many in Sydney. We've helped support the wonderful work of Rev. Seti Latu in Redfern through an uplifting supper. We've raised money for Banksia Women and Rough Edges in Darlinghurst and continued our associations with the Asylum Seekers Centre, Bread of Life and Eden Canoes Project. Verity Thomson's heart and her tireless energy to pursue what is right and good are praiseworthy. I want to especially mention her work and thank her as her time as our Social Outreach Coordinator has come to an end.

SENIORS MINISTRY

Our Seniors ministry continues to bless many at Moran, Vaucluse Aged Care and Beresford House. This includes many personal visits to residents where we provide care, support and prayer. The value the staff and attendees place on these services is a great encouragement and a demonstration of their impact.

MISSION

Our mission work extends to theological education in Indonesia and Nungalinya College Darwin to church ministry in the Middle East with CMS and the mining town of Roxby Downs with Bush Church Aid.

LOOKING FORWARD

The departure of Stuart and Jane was very significant for us. They led SHAP through an amalgamation, laying a vision and path for a common life of ministry together.

They also led through the tumult of COVID with wonderfully thoughtful and attentive pastoral care. There are indelible marks of their commitment to ministry in our Aged Care Services, Little Sheep, Community Lunch and our Sunday worship, not to mention the many individual lives touched by their prayers and words. Many now call Jesus their Lord through Stuart and Jane's longing to tell of Jesus' gracious love.

THE NEXT GENERATION

One of our most pressing needs is to reach the next generation of Watsons Bay and Vaucluse with the good news of Jesus. Our young people are the church and will continue to be it into the future. To this end, Nicky Hay will be taking on a role in leading Little Sheep Church on Sundays. Meg Weston will be leading Little Sheep PlayTime during the week, supported by Tobias Buckley.



Tobias Buckley will fulfill this role as Student Children's Minister. In this we are seeking to replace the time and energy given by Jane Robinson so generously in her time at SHAP.

KAMBALA

In addition to this, we are continuing and deepening our work with Kambala. Stuart strengthened our historical relationship with Kambala through his diligent work. In 2024, we've formalised this relationship and will seek to provide senior chaplaincy to the school. A close working relationship with Kambala is vital to restarting youth ministry in our parish. To aid with the additional time required for this during the week, Paul Perini has agreed to come and assist with our aged care services in 2024.

CHILDREN & FAMILIES

There are still more questions for us to ask and answer with the renewal of children's ministry at St Michael's being an absolute priority for our mission. We need to start considering what it means for us as a multi-site parish to do ministry effectively on a Sunday. To this end, a survey was released at the beginning of February to discern our Sunday life as a parish as we look to the future.

Seniors Ministry Report – Meg Matthews

Our Seniors ministry remains a privilege and joy. Weekly Moran services at 2pm on Tuesdays are a highlight, with average attendance of 25, both from independent living units and the nursing home. SHAP provides a strong team ministry, with Jeff, Meg, Verity, Tanya, Jane, Stuart and in later months Matt, all of whom have contributed greatly.

Weekly services are a happy mix of hymns, prayers, Bible readings and words of hope and inspiration, all set in a casual and friendly context. A number of our regulars tell us that this for them is a reconnection with matters of faith after a long break, harking back to memories of Sunday School or Christian school assemblies. The nature of our Seniors ministry means that we have sadly farewelled some of our regular attendees. We've been privileged to be invited to share in funeral planning.

We have continued to run fortnightly services in Beresford Hall Rose Bay and Vaucluse Nursing Home Young Street, where old and new friendships have been forged. Individual room visits also take place in both these homes. It is important that people feel valued and remembered, while bringing Christian hope, encouragement, friendship and prayer.

A NEW INITIATIVE FOR 2024

A new initiative for 2024 sees steps toward SHAP becoming a dementia friendly organisation. We are partnering with Holdsworth Community Organisation to become an outreach centre for one morning a month to provide activities and morning tea at St Peter's Hall. This would provide some much-needed respite for dementia carers in the parish, whilst offering a safe, enjoyable program for those with dementia.

Ministry with SHAP Seniors is a vital part of our living and growing parish community. The senior years of life can be challenging on many levels, and our church community is a place to offer loving support and inclusion for all.



"He heals the broken hearted and binds up their wounds." (Psalm 147:3 ESV)

Praise and thanksgiving to our Sovereign God for His amazing love and for making us in His image and designing us to need Him, to love Him and each other.

It is through acts of pastoral relationships that the love God has for us is evidenced as we nurture each other in times of joy, trial, and celebration, sickness (physical, emotional, and mental ill health), grief, fear, loneliness, relationship issues, financial concerns, legal issues and more.

Pastoral care relationship in 2023, loving each other included visiting people in hospital, rehab facilities, home visits, escorting people with medical appointments, giving respite care, helping with shopping, upholding each other in times of grief. Meeting for morning or afternoon tea/coffee, praying with and for people, on the phone / face to face. We know that "when we pray God works".

MENTAL HEALTH

Mental health encompasses emotional, psychological, and social wellbeing. In 2023 we ran two workshops on "Mental III Health First aid", "Mental III Health and Young People."



The workshops were very well attended providing valuable information - for example the difference between "Mental III Health", and "Mental Health" plus facts and figures and more. Trinette the trainer walked us through these sessions with professionalism, humour, and openness. We received much needed information to help individuals and us as a church family.

DEMENTIA

We have joined the Woollahra Council Dementia Alliance and Holdsworth which meets every other month. This is a multiagency group raising awareness through workshops and events / activities for people with dementia and their families. In September we ran a workshop on Dementia Awareness at St Peters. The workshop was well attended, with much valuable information being given.

PRAYER FOR HEALING SERVICES

Stuart led healing Services at St. Peter's every other month on Thursday evenings. The attendance was small but all who attended said that they found the services uplifting, encouraging, comforting and giving peace especially when being overwhelmed by circumstances. Some also had answers to prayers. Follow-up continues.



Social Outreach Ministry Report – Verity Thomson



It gives me great pleasure to report that our Social Outreach Ministry continues to spread Jesus' love and care for all throughout the Eastern Suburbs and beyond. I have been really encouraged by the level of support and encouragement during my time as Honorary Social Outreach Coordinator. Here is a brief outline of our ministry in 2023.

ANGLICARE

On Friday 20th of October, we held the inaugural 'Supper at Sunset' event to raise funds in support of the ministry of Rev. Seti Latu at One For Life church in Redfern. The event was superbly organised by Doreen Laforest and Genevieve Scarf and was very well supported with food donations and raffle prizes. The event raised an impressive \$11,300!

Throughout the year we continued to collect tinned food and such for those doing it tough and delivered many bags of groceries to Anglicare's warehouse at Villawood.

With the support of Kambala Junior School and Cranbrook Pre-School we had another wonderful response to the Christmas 'Toys 'n' Tucker Appeal' and managed to fill 100 boxes.

BREAD OF LIFE

Teams from South Head including Wendy Jarratt are beginning their seventeenth year of service to the Bread of Life ministry at Surry Hills. The team attend on the second Sunday of each month to help serve breakfast to the appreciative companions at St. Michael's, Surry Hills.



COMMON GRACE

We regularly encourage members of our church to be better informed on topics such as Environment, Justice, Indigenous Issues amongst others by signing up to the 'Common Grace' newsletters, participating in prayer vigils and donating when possible.

ASYLUM SEEKERS CENTRE (ASC)

We partner with the ASC to highlight the plight of the thousands of asylum seekers both here and offshore and we regularly encourage members of our church to donate grocery gift cards and make financial donations.

Through an initiative of SHAP member Alison Keene, who is a staff member at the ASC, we partnered with 'Mummies Paying It Forward', who provide baby clothes & equipment to asylum seeking families. Our Little Sheep families were extremely generous and their donations filled two carloads!

We also held a 'Nappies in November' drive which was fantastically well supported by our Little Sheep families.





Eden Canoes Project

EDEN CANOES PROJECT

Since November 2020, the Eden Canoes Initiative has enabled nearly 100 youth, predominantly Indigenous, to construct, decorate and paddle tour canoes on the beautiful waterways surrounding Eden, NSW. The program encourages Indigenous youth in the celebration of their culture and belonging.

Eden Canoes is exploring the possibility of an 'Out of Eden' workshop, conducted in Tanja for the Bega Local Aboriginal land Council. For these wider possibilities Eden Canoes continues to work closely with Eden Marine High (EMH), most recently in collaboration with PCYC. Eden Canoes is developing its partnership with Twofold Aboriginal Corporation and celebrates its foundational support from Anglicare (NSW South, West and ACT) and South Head Anglican Parish.

With the exception of Rev. Michael Palmer, an Anglicare Community Chaplain (& ex-Rector of St. Michael's 2004-2017), the team is entirely Indigenous.



ROUGH EDGES and BANKSIA WOMEN (St. John's Community Services)

With an ever-growing number of homeless and marginalised people in our city, we regularly partner with 'Rough Edges' who provide a meal and a safe place to meet for people in these situations. This year our 'Roughtober Sleepout' team - Angali, Stuart, Verity & Matt - raised over \$8,700 for Rough Edges.

We also partner with 'Banksia Women' who offer advice and support to women fleeing domestic violence. An initiative of our wonderful 'hospitality experts', Doreen Laforest, Genevieve Scarf and Mags Mead, was to open a Morning Tea Room in the Sun Room at St. Michael's where they provided tea, coffee and delicious homemade cakes to happy customers in a pretty and welcoming atmosphere. The Tea Room was so popular that they were able to give Banksia Women over \$800 on behalf of SHAP.

Closing remarks from Verity

On a personal note, this year I have decided to step down from my position as Social Outreach Coordinator. I will still be around to help the new coordinator, get involved in fundraising events and will continue to encourage our SHAP members to support the important causes and further demonstrate God's Love in action.





Missionary Report - Louise Kaye

In 2023, we continued to support the same missionaries as previously although towards the end of the year our commitment of three years' college fees for Peter Manumbu came to completion. Peter successfully graduated from Bunda Bible college in Tanzania and commenced his role as a pastor locally. His support has been under the auspices of Anglican Aid to whom we have donated on his behalf.

More recently, they have opened a room in their house for a Sunday Play Time, servicing about four hundred children. In the second half of 2024, the family will be coming back for home assignment in Australia.

There are five other mission families and organisations with whom we at South Head Anglican Parish partner, through a small amount financially and through our prayers. Ten percent of our Sunday offering is divided between the five groups.

This year now has two members including Catherine Kalokerinos and Louise Kaye after the resignation of Caroline Frykberg. Caroline has been a great asset in the team with her creative and practical ideas and with her family connections with Mission Aviation Fellowship. On behalf of us all I would like to thank her for all that she has done and send her our best wishes as she spends more time out of Sydney.

NUNGALINYA COLLEGE IN DARWIN



This is a combined churches college in Darwin where First Nations Christians from remote communities are offered further training in basic literacy, numeracy, music, media, Bible translation and theology. The college offers school groups live-in courses on indigenous culture.

2023 has been a very special year for the college as it celebrated fifty years since its founding. The principal, Ben Van Gelderen, visited St. Michael's this year bringing with him a wonderful artwork created by the students illustrating the freedom from bondage to sin that Christ gives, and commemorating the previous fifty years of the college.

SHAP's Vintage Fair organised by Jennifer Glasson and Helen Van Der Meulen and their teams raised \$16,000 this year for the work at Nungalinya.

Music

This were exemplified in the Taize services which provided another wonderful means of peacefully meditating on the work of the Lord on Holy days in 2023.

Supporting Clergy

Jeff Ware has particularly served Sunday's at SHAP with his warm service leading and winsome, vivid preaching. The Lord has provided a great shepherd to us in this season in Jeff. The parish was very grateful to Paul Perini and his wife Michelle for Paul once again taking up the position of acing rector when Stuart and Jane were on leave.

Bruce Kaye's Ministry

In 2023, the Rev. Dr. Bruce Kaye finished up as a regular preacher and presider at communion at SHAP, ending a ministry which he has regularly held in the parish since 1983. The regularity and stability of Bruce's ministry has been a rare gift to us as a parish. Bruce's persistent desire to aid the church in making sense of discipleship in a complex world has been a hallmark of his preaching and pastoral care

for many in the various seasons of life. It has been a remarkable privilege to have Bruce's incisive mind and heart leading us in Sunday worship. We appreciate and honour his work among us.

Referendum Presentation

Our services continue to look outward as well, with interviews of Allegra Spender and the Minniecon family as well as parishioners. In addition, at the prompting of the Archbishop, we sought to promote an affirmation of the voice to Parliament in the 2023. Michael Jensen, Michael Stead, Joel Harrison, Allegra Spender and Uncle Ray Minniecon all provided compelling reasons for a "yes" vote. It was an honour to be a publicly involved in seeking the common good of our country.

Wardens' Report and Financial Statements

2023 and 2024 are years of transition for our parish, and this has a significant impact on the results for the 2023 and the 2024 budget.

We were delighted to welcome Rev. Matt Aroney with Kass, Lucy, Henry and Poppy to our community in July 2023. They moved into the Rectory at Watsons Bay in September following the completion of minor renovations. The financial impact of this was that we were paying two full time ministers for the second half of the year: there were costs associated with the renovation and the Rectory was no longer available for rental.

As Matt has mentioned in his report, the Parish plans to expand its ministry by engaging in Chaplaincy work at Kambala. This will provide significant additional income for ministry. We commence 2024 with a Ministry Team consisting of Matt with part-time support. It is reasonable to expect that we will be able to bring additional support during the year, but we cannot predict the nature and the timing. Therefore, our budget for the entire year accommodates two full-time staff, offering flexibility to hire additional team members as needed.

In 2023 we embarked on a major renovation of the Curate's Cottage at Watsons Bay. After a slow start, work is now underway and is expected to be completed in the third quarter of 2024.

The cost, in excess of \$500,000, is being funded from the funds held by the Anglican Church Property Trust from the proceeds of the sale of the Wentworth Memorial Church. We have not included any potential rental from the property in the 2024 budget.

Following Stuart and Jane's retirement, the Vaucluse Rectory has become vacant until we use it for new ministry staff. Currently, Rev. Chase Kuhn, the new Rector of St. Matthias Centennial Park is living in the rectory with his family while St. Matthias completes renovations on their rectory. We have assumed for the budget that it will be possible to rent the rectory out commercially for the remainder of 2024.

The Wardens wish to thank all those who have contributed their time, skills and resources to our community at South Head Anglican during 2023.

We express our sincere gratitude to Stuart and Jane Robinson. Through their diligence, vision and devotion to the spiritual and pastoral care of each member of our community, we are greatly blessed.

We thank God for their leadership, godliness and humility in serving us here at South Head Anglican Parish and we pray for them in their retirement.

- Parish Offertories and donations were stable in 2023. There
 was an increase in regular giving which is encouraging. The
 total was lower than 2022 due to some large one-off
 donations that year.
- The ministry income is primarily from community lunch donations, weddings and funerals. The number of weddings held at the churches has declined over recent years. In 2024 we expect to receive \$45,000 income from the provision of chaplaincy services to Kambala.
- 3. The income from the Columbarium has continues to decline so we have not budgeted for any increase in 2023, and additional efforts will be made to market this beautiful facility for our community. The amount available to the Parish represents the income less costs of repairs and maintenance of the facility. We are also putting aside 10% of net income into a long-term preservation account.
- 4. Rental income was lower in 2023 as the Curate's Cottage and Watsons Bay Rectory ceased to be rented during the year. We are expecting additional rental income in 2024 from the Vaucluse Rectory.
- We received two grants in 2024. \$11,300 from the NSW Government for the works on the bathrooms and \$7,000 from Woollahra Council for the Community Lunches.
- Parish Salaries were higher in 2023 following the appointment of Rev. Matt Aroney. As discussed above, we are budgeting for two full time ministry staff in 2024 to give flexibility for hiring later in the year.
- There was a significant increase in Diocesan Levies in 2023
 as the Diocese phases in a Property Levy. Our income was
 lower in 2022 than 2021, so the amounts will reduce in
 2024.
- As discussed above there is some volatility in the overall result from Ordinary Church Activities. There is a reasonable expectation of a surplus in 2024 based on increased rental income, income from Kambala and

- reduced staffing. This should be seen as a fund for future growth.
- In addition to the work on the Curate's Cottage, the following major projects were carried out in 2023.
 - Renovate St Peter's rectory including new carpet, painting inside and out, remove dilapidated garden ponds, and, install child proof fence at front.
 - Renovate St Michaels rectory including new carpet, painting inside.
 - Installation of new windows and door at upper entrance to St Michael's Hall
 - Installation of security door to void next to upper entrance to St Michael's Hall
 - New sandstone steps to main entrance of St Michael's Church

Major projects planned for 2024 include:

- St Peter's Stonework
- Stainless steel handrail for path in Bush area at St
 Peter's (awaiting govt grant app result)
- Prayer garden involving benches and landscaping at St Peter's
- Flooring of St Paul's Chapel (St Michaels)
- Repair of stone wall at St Michaels Rectory
- 10. \$2,728,004 is held by the Anglican Property Trust from the proceeds of Wentworth Memorial Church. We are expecting to spend at least \$500,000 of those funds on the refurbishment of the Curate's Cottage and stonework at St. Peter's Church. In 2022 this amount was shown as \$3,648,145, as it had not been adjusted for the \$980,516 relating to payments made to the Anglican Church NCNC Fund from the Watsons Bay ACPT Fund in 2021.

Repairs to our rented properties, and to the churches and rectory are constant and ongoing.


